E-Newsletter: What can you tell us about Manufacturing in Nigeria?

Mrs. Emilia Akpan: We are having a lot of challenges. That was what brought me into Manufacturers Association of Nigeria. I felt that I should be in the position to say what we can do to help us manufacture competitively and the only way you can do it is to go into an organization like MAN. We don't have skilled man power, so even if you have the money you don't have the people to actualize your dreams. Definitely you have to work twice as much because a lot of people believe in shortcuts. You know manufacturing is something that takes time. It has to be in your blood for you to understand it and stay in the market, if not it can be frustrating. We do not have efficient power supply. If

you don't have power how would you work? We generate our own power. The other problem we have is, government is not supportive. The era when government did support manufacturing is long gone. Government would prefer to import things and they will also condemn the quality of the goods but the Chinese government and the Indians believe in their own products so much so that they make it as a policy for all their government parastatals to buy their own products. That way you make your mistakes and you improve on them. Another thing is; they have very good technical schools not necessarily for those who are not intellectually able but there are some people who are naturally very good, they go to technical schools. Here they look down on technical schools. See the discrimination between polytechnics and universities. They make the polytechnics look as if they are inferior which is not true. In those days if you really want good skilled workmen, you go to polytechnics. They don't have time for long grammar they will just get the job done. But now most people prefer to go to the universities, they come back, sit down, fold their hands and tell you they want a job of how many millions. Manufacturing is something that normally government supports. They provide the basic infrastructures which are water, electricity, roads, etc. All manner of bills comes and they are not taking lightly. These are some of the reasons why some people packed their things and left. Manufacturing is the major means by which we can help the youths. Manufacturing in the country is not the way it should be.

Interview with Mrs. Ekama Emilia Akpan on Manufacturing

E-Newsletter: What do you think can be done to make manufacturing better than what it is?

Mrs. Emilia Akpan: Funding, cheaper funding. Talk about it, keep on talking about it. Government should also encourage and buy goods from manufacturers. The issue of locally made goods was started by us. "Made in Nigeria" goods. At least people should wear our traditional clothes and go to work or formulate your own type of design that makes it unique. This is coming up. You see now, even internationally, people are now wearing our fabrics. That was what the Ghanaian did and the flooded the American markets with their kente. The youths should be encouraged and be told that it is more sustainable to have something to do. If you work for somebody what he does is, he takes the best part of your life and leaves you with nothing. If you have your own business, chances are that at least you will leave fifty—eighty percent of some sustainable things for your grandchildren like the yorubas are doing. They are in second and third generations of manufacturers right now. Those people doing the foam are the second and third

generations. And as they are coming they are improving on what their parents started. They have a better culture of these things than us. There is no country that has grown without manufacturing. We are supporting other countries. Any time you buy goods from other countries you are supporting their own economy and our own economy is going down. So we need to teach our children how to be sustainable and manufacturing is one way we can do it.
