E-Newsletter: What are the challenges faced by female Engineers in Nigeria?

Engr. Mrs. Ohagwa: Female Engineers are faced with a plethora of challenges, the foremost of which is DISCRIMINA-TION in the work place. There is also the issue of pregnancy and motherhood. Absence of a female mentor in the work place. Engineering being male dominated profession and as such the few female entrants are negatively perceived as strange members. Consequently the female Engineer has to be focused and also to put in extra efforts in order to manifestly reverse the wrongly held notion about female Engineers. The afore mentioned challenges are even more pronounced amongst certain fields of Engineering regarded as exclusives for men such as Civil, Mechanical, etc.
