An Interview with Engr. Ebele Okeke FICE, FNSE, CFR, On the Welfare of Nigerian Engineers.

E-Newsletter: We are members of the E-Newsletter team of the Nigerian Society of Engineers, Port Harcourt branch and we publish our newsletter every two weeks. Today we will be discussing the welfare of the Nigerian engineers. Before we proceed, can you tell us about yourself?

Engr. Ebele Okeke: I am the first Nigerian lady Civil Engineer and the first lady engineer to be Permanent Secretary and I am the first lady Head of Service. I studied civil engineering in University of London in England and

I have an MBA from the University of Nigeria, Nsukka. I am a fellow in the Nigerian Society of Engineers, Fellow of the Institution of Civil Engineers Great Britain, Ireland. I have national honours, OON and CFR.

E-Newsletter: Thank you madam. Being the first lady civil engineer, how was the challenge like being a lady amongst men?

Engr. Ebele Okeke: I wouldn't say it was challenging because in the university, in the class that I was in, I was the only lady in the class of twenty-eight boys. So I have already started acclimating myself to working with men. As a matter of fact I feel more comfortable with men than women.

E-Newsletter: Thank you very much. In the Nigerian society, how do you rate the welfare of

Nigerian engineers? Is it above standard or below standard? Is it encouraging for the growth of the engineering profession? I mean like their salary at the end of the month. You find engineering graduates working in banks instead of doing engineering jobs. Is it encouraging for the engineering profession?

Engr. Ebele Okeke: For engineers working in banks that is ok. If the banks get involved in infrastructural projects, they need the engineers. But generally, taking the salary of the Nigerian engineers, I wouldn't say it is very encouraging. They get more in the private sector. In the civil service it is not quite encouraging and we have been trying to fight to get at least the entry level. You know the doctors, I think their entry level is Level 12. For the engineers we have been able to get Level 10. With time I'm sure that things would improve, but now, I wouldn't say it is at the point it should be.

E-Newsletter: What advice would you give to the Nigerian engineers to enable them sustain in the profession, especially now that their welfare package is not too good?

Engr. Ebele Okeke: First of all you have to be interested in what you are doing. Everything is not all about money. First of all, I will encourage the Nigerian engineers to focus on the professional aspect of it; not just giving up. I have noticed that a number of engineers do not take their professional exams. They will just get into government or into an organization. They rise up to the top, and then at the end of the day we encourage them to come and take fellowship;

that shouldn't be the case. They should start from when they are young to focus on their profession and grow because if we all focus on the profession, we will all be singing from the same page. You can only get the welfare of Nigerian engineers improved if everybody is interested in the profession. Look at the doctors, the doctors sing from one page, the lawyer sing from one page. That is what we should be doing. The doctors have procedure. Take for example, we are talking about round pegs in round holes, most of these engineering organizations are not headed by engineers in government but if it is medicine, everything is for doctors and even their ministers are medical doctors. We all have to try and make sure our profession is well recognized. It is when you have recognized your own profession that you will be able to fight as a group; that you will be able to have a pressure group from government and any other organization. Thank you.
