Interview with Engr. Mrs. Margaret Oguntala on Women in Engineering.

Engr. Mrs. Margaret Oguntala is a chemical engineer. She joined NSE in1995 and she is now the Chairman of Ikeja Branch of the Nigerian Society of Engineers.

E-Newsletter: What does it take as a woman to be the chairman of a branch in the mist of so many male engineers?

Engr. Margaret: All it takes is just what it takes, hard work. You know in engineering, it is not that gender sensitive. I mean you will know that we have fewer women but the engineering profession is one where it doesn't matter whether you are a man or woman. All you need to do is to be a good engineer and so, I have been what I should be, a good engineer and a member of my just about it.

E-Newsletter: Thank you very much. As the Chairman of the Ikeja Branch, what encouraging words do you have for other female engineers?

Engr. Margaret: For upcoming female engineers I would say just do your work, do your bit but any environment in which you find yourself, try to make a mark by doing whatsoever task you are given. Do it well and don't think of the fact that you are a woman. As long as you see yourself as an engineer then there is no problem. The sky is your limit.

E-Newsletter: Thank you very much. I could remember when we were in the university, in the faculty of engineering; there were more women in the chemical engineering department than other departments. Why is it that women engineers are attracted to the chemical profession, not mechanical, not electrical, they are always more in chemical engineering. That was my experience branch and I did all I needed to do to prove myself as a good leader. That is in the university. You were in the chemical engineering department; so what prompt you to go into chemical engineering?

Engr. Margaret: I will give vou my own personal experi-

ence. I was actually admitted in the University of Benin, Civil Engineering Department but you know each individual has some strength and weaknesses. I did not like engineering drawing and after my first year, I made enquiries and I was told that for civil engineering, I needed engineering drawing up to the 4th year and I just think I that did not need all of that. So I changed to chemical engineering. That is my own personal experience but I think seriously when I was in school too we had girls in all the other fields but generally really you are right. We had more female engineering students in my set;

we had more in chemical engineering. I don't know why others went into chemical engineering. I wouldn't know why others chose chemical engineering but mechanical engineering is not more difficult than chemical engineering. Electrical engineering is not much difficult and you see that women in other fields of engineering prove themselves as good engineers. I am sure it could be some personal reasons and maybe due to Engr. Oguntala & Engr. Otueneh counseling. I don't know but I am sure that



there are several reasons why some women chose chemical engineering.
